

# The Prohibition Bumper Sticker

While driving on today's roads it is common to see bumper stickers on the backs of automobiles. These stickers convey many different types of messages, including political ones. In the following assignment you will create a bumper sticker that either supports or opposes Prohibition. Bumper stickers first began appearing on cars in the US shortly before WWII, so they did not exist during the Prohibition era. However, you are to create your sticker as if it was a common thing during the 1920s.

## **Directions:**

1. Use an 8 ½ x 11 sheet of blank copy paper.
2. Your bumper sticker must include both a slogan and a drawing.
3. The drawing can be a symbol in lieu of people and/or actions. However, there is no limit to what you can do.
4. Use the paper in landscape mode (horizontally) and for the top and bottom start two inches in for size.
5. All drawings and slogans must be tasteful. Do not use profanity or any other objectionable language, design or images.
6. Your bumper sticker will either support prohibition or oppose it. Your reasoning should be in the slogan, and/or how you present the drawing.
7. Please utilize color, correct spelling and grammar, and write and draw clearly and neatly.
8. No points will be allocated to sloppy, rushed or thoughtless work.
9. Your work should be of the 1920s. Please refrain from imagery and slogans from outside the era.
10. Please include at least one piece of 1920s slang. You have been provided the dictionary.
